Background

In 2014 the North Carolina Annual Conference chapters of Reconciling Ministries Network, Reconciling United Methodists and Friends NC, and Methodist Federation for Social Action renamed their combined lunch at Annual Conference the Gayle Felton Love Thy Neighbor Lunch in memory the Reverend Dr. Gayle Felton who had chaired the board of RMN and was active with both chapters. A native of Pinetops, Gayle graduated from North Carolina Wesleyan College and taught high school in Edgecombe County before answering the call to ministry. She received her Masters of Divinity and Doctorate from Duke University. Gayle taught at Meredith College and Duke Divinity School. Her published works include This Gift of Water, By Water and the Spirit, This Holy Mystery, United Methodists and the Sacraments, and The Coming of Jesus. Gayle had a deep commitment to social justice, working to integrate the public schools in Edgecombe County and as a pioneer in building the Reconciling Movement, a group advocating for the full inclusion of LGBT persons in the United Methodist Church. Gayle also was a role model for women seeking ordination in the United Methodist Church, working tirelessly to remove many of the obstacles she herself had to overcome in becoming an ordained elder.

Statement on recent Judicial Council Rulings with Bishop Reverend Dr. Karen Oliveto and requiring boards of ordained ministry to ask questions about one's sexuality

The North Carolina Conference chapter of the Methodist Federation for Social Action expresses deep concern over the recent ruling by the Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church regarding the Reverend Dr. Karen Oliveto who currently serves as Bishop of the Mountain Sky Conference in the Western Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church. To nullify or rule void her consecration as a bishop of The United Methodist Church even though they followed the procedures according to the guidelines of the church and those present knew who she was is an affront to the word of God. In Galatians 5:22-23 it says "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control". Jesus does not engage in identity when he asks who neighbor is in Luke 10:25-37. Whether we are a Samaritan, a Levite, or a priest we are all God's children.

We are also concerned the Judicial Council's other ruling with respect to the requirement that all candidates for ordination be asked question about their sexuality/sexual orientation. Are other questions to be asked as well? Or is this more of The United Methodist Church just singling out a particular class of persons. Is that what Jesus would do? Christ never mentioned sexual orientation in the Gospels. He did have much to say about poverty, abuse of power, and loving one's neighbor regardless of "identity".

We the North Carolina Conference chapter of the Methodist Federation for Social Action stand with our LBTQIA clergy, bishops, and laity. We advocate for full inclusion of LGBTQIA persons in the full life and ministry of The United Methodist Church.
